#### **Meet the Characters:**

**Macduff**: Imagine Macduff as the hero trying to set things right. He's out to stop Macbeth after some terrible things happen to his family. His role is like the good guy fighting against the bad guy.

**Banquo**: Banquo is Macbeth's friend who becomes suspicious of him. He's like the wise friend who realises something's not right and pays a price for it. His character helps show how someone can be betrayed by a friend.

**Lady-in-waiting**: This character isn't super central, but she gives us a peek into the royal court's drama. She's like a background character, showing us what life is like around the main characters.

**Malcolm**: He's the rightful heir to the throne after King Duncan. Malcolm runs away to save himself but comes back to reclaim his rightful place. His story is about coming back to make things right.

**Doctor**: The doctor takes care of Lady Macbeth when she starts acting strangely. He's like the observer who notices when something's wrong and tries to help, showing us the human side of the story.

**Apparitions**: These are like spooky ghostly figures that give Macbeth misleading advice. They make Macbeth think he's invincible but lead him down the wrong path. They add a mysterious and creepy element to the story.

**Servant / Assassin**: These characters do the dirty work for Macbeth. They follow his orders to harm others, showing how power can corrupt people and make them do bad things.

#### About Giuseppe Verdi:

Verdi was deeply influenced by Shakespeare's works throughout his career, and "Macbeth" was one of the playwright's plays that particularly resonated with him.
